

How to Create an Abstract, Poster, and Prepare to Deliver a Poster Presentation



WHAT IS A POSTER?

- A poster is a summary of your scientific research or creative project presented in a visually engaging way. It is intended to highlight the content and context of your academic or professional work.
- Methods, results, conclusions, and reasons for the research are displayed using text, graphs, charts, photographs, and images on a poster board no larger than 48" x 36".
- The poster should be able to stand on its own as a clear, logical representation of your work, requiring no explanation.
- Topic categories include experimental research, literature reviews, and educational protocols (see below).
- Posters will be presented to conference attendees during a 90-minute concurrent session where authors will be given dedicated time to explain their posters and answer viewers' questions.
- Posters will remain displayed throughout the conference at designated times for viewing by attendees, guests, and vendors.
- An easel to display your poster will be provided onsite.

CATEGORIES FOR CONSIDERATION

Experimental research – Visual representation of in vitro or in vivo experiments. If animals or human subjects are involved, verification of appropriate healthcare compliance guidelines must be met.

Literature review – Visual representation of a literature review that fills a gap in the literature.

Educational protocols -Visual representation of an educational protocol that will potentially improve a healthcare concern.



YOUR ABSTRACT WILL BE EVALUATED ON THE FOLLOWING REQUIREMENTS.

- Topic is relevant to the holistic nutrition profession
- Topic is within NANP's Scope of Practice and Code of Ethics
- 300 words or less
- Does not contain references
- Does not sell a product/service
- Title is clearly stated in 12 words or less
- Research MOTIVATION, PROBLEM, RESULTS and CONCLUSIONS are clearly stated
- Flows well and is easy to understand
- Appropriate grammar, spelling, and punctuation are used
